October Political Update

The Tax Reform proposed by President Trump is a work in progress with more details to come, but the basic blueprint is on the table. The number of tax brackets will be minimized from seven to three. This allows for a double in the standard deduction, meaning Americans with the lowest earnings will pay little to no taxes. The top bracket will also benefit from a tax cut, which drops the rate from 39.6% to 35%. To avoid such a drastic tax cut for the top 1%, the possibility of a fourth bracket is in consideration.

The reform also repeals the Alternative Minimum Tax, which is a regulation that keeps people from reaping too many benefits from regular tax law.

President Trump promises that the reform will allow small businesses to boom but critics worry that it benefits the "top 1%" and could possibly raise taxes for the middle class. The purpose of the reform is to hopefully allow for more people to fit into the exempt category of the tax brackets system.

Raising the standard deduction is significant but merely presenting a plan that raises the lowest rate and cuts the top rate in a country with so much pay inequality seems poorly thought out.

Nearly 50 ISIS aligned terrorists -- armed with rocket propelled grenades and machine guns -- ambushed a group of twelve United States army soldiers on October 4. Four American soldiers and five Nigerian soldiers were killed in the line of fire.

Special forces troops were ambushed during a routine training mission along the Mali - Niger border, leaving four Green Berets left for dead and another two injured. One of the four soldiers was recovered by Nigerian soldiers nearly two hours after the fact. Soldiers, vastly outnumbered and lightly armed, paid the price with their lives.

French military was called in to airlift the wounded and deceased out of the area, while French, Nigerian and American soldiers continue military operations and search for the attackers.

Military intelligence deemed it highly unlikely that soldiers run into enemy fighters despite the area being considered a hotbed for Al Qaeda activity.

Nearly a month after the event, investigations continue to identify the attackers. A team of investigators reported that enemy fighters used perfectly spaced firing positions along the roadside, suggesting a level of sophistication to the ambush. As investigations are set to continue, more details are expected in the coming months.

Academic Decathlon prepares for upcoming competitions

Following a successful year at state level competitions, El Rancho's Division I Academic Decathlon team hopes to go even higher with its new members.

The United States Academic Decathlon (USAD for short) is a non-profit organization that allows students all over the country to compete academically in ten areas.

The participants take rigorous exams in Social Science, Art, Literature, Music, Economics, Mathematics, and Science, and also are required to write an essay based on topics they've learned, participate in an interview, write and present a speech about any topic, and present an impromptu speech on a randomly selected prompt. They also compete in a Super Quiz, where every team has seven seconds to answer questions about the topics shown on a screen and has a live audience cheering them on.

The team is currently studying this year's material, which is centered around Africa, and preparing for its first scrimmage on November 18th. In preparation, some of the members attended a workshop at Mark Keppel High School, designed to further prepare teams for the rigors of the competition.

"They came back with the feeling that they knew con-

siderably more than the kids from the other schools," Mr. Retana, team advisor, said.

Currently, the team has 15 members; however, the Varsity team only has room for nine members, who are divided into three slots by GPA, to compete. The Honors slot includes members with an academic GPA of 3.75 or greater. Scholastic includes members with a GPA between 3.0 to 3.75. Varsity encompasses those with a GPA below 3.0.

The team is using the scores from scrimmage to determine who will have a spot on the competing lineup. Despite the competition to secure a coveted position,

the team remains extremely close.

Mr. Retana, along with Mr. Francis, Mr. Porter, Mrs. Stubendorff, Mr. Wlasick, Mr. Magdaleno, and Mrs. Chavez-Diaz, are coaching the team in each subject. The team meet with these coaches once every other week, even having to sacrifice sleeping in to attend Magdaleno's AP Art History zero period every other Wednesday or staying late every other Monday after school with Mr. Francis to study geometry and introductory calculus.

"Decath math is different than school math in the sense that you have to learn it really quickly, so I try to use tricks and

theorems that allow us to get to answers quickly," Francis said. "We have really bright kids, and they're generally hard-working."

Retana, along with team captains Melissa Ochoa, Julio Ornelas, and Andrew Sepulveda, are extremely hopeful about this year's group.

"Decath is moving smoother and more efficiently than it did last year," Sepulveda said.

"I feel we have a strong team; it's hard for them to know that they're doing well because they have no comparison," Retana said, "but I feel like we're well ahead of where we were last year and we performed well last year."

The music that surrounds the park is much darker than what you would expect at Disneyland. At the hub, there's a custom made 13-foot tall Headless horseman statue. The horse's eyes glow red, its nose blows smoke, and the horseman's pumpkin head flares with flame.

Jack Skellington from "The Nightmare Before Christmas" returns to the Haunted Mansion, Space Mountain is now the Ghost Galaxy coaster, and a giant Mickey Mouse jack-o'-lantern is glowing on Main Street, U.S.A. Halloween is officially in the air at Disneyland Resort!

For the first time in Disney history, California Adventure is also getting a spooky makeover, and it's said to be much more "dark and edgy" than Disneyland's, said Charlie Kowalski, art director at Disneyland Resort.

Disney California Adventure has never fully had the Halloween makeover, though in the late 2000's the park had an overlay called Candy Corn Acres. But that was nothing compared to what California Adventure has going on now.

An 80-foot-long, 35-foot-tall, six-ton Oogie Boogie from "The Nightmare Before Christmas" towers over California Adventure's entrance. The villain

Restaurants in the park are offering Halloween-themed sweet treats such as Mummy Macaron Ice Cream, "Ghostly" Pepper Nachos, and Bat Wing Raspberry Sundaes.

When the sun sets, the new Guardians of the Galaxy attraction also transforms. The free-fall ride features a new song and video called "Monsters After Dark." Workers wear first-responder gear as guests are




