This month, El Rancho's drama department performed its first production of the year titled *In the Heights*. This show is the first El Rancho production directed by the new drama coach Juan Olivares.

The dress rehearsal for the musical was held at six PM on Wednesday, February 13th and opening night took place on Valentine's Day. The musical continued to run until the following Saturday, February 15th.

In the Heights is a musical with music and lyrics written by Lin-Manuel Miranda and book by Quiara Alegría Hudes.

In the Heights is set over the course of three days, involving characters in the largely Hispanic-American neighborhood of Washington Heights in New York City and their own individuals stories as they struggle to adapt to gentrification taking over their community.

Senior Tony Cortez is at the center of the show is playing bodega owner Usnavi. He looks after the neighborhood's aging Cuban lady Abuela Claudia (played by Galilea Madrid) and is head over heels for Brianna Sanchez's character Van-

essa, who is a worker in the neighboring beauty salon who dreams of living leaving the barrio and owning an apartment downtown.

Meanwhile, Nina, played by Geysa Govea, has returned to the neighborhood from her first year at Stanford University with shocking news that she has decided to drop out, leaving her parents Kevin and Carla-played by Xavier Marquez and Alyssa Escalera-flustered. Ultimately, Usnavi and the residents of the close-knit neighborhood learn the true meaning of family and friendship in the heights.

The selection for this year's musical was inspired by the students of El Rancho and citizen of Pico Rivera. "*In the Heights* is my favorite musical of all time! It reminds me so much of home," says Olivares.

"I also chose to produce *In the Heights* because of its theme of gentrification and survival," continues Olivares. "We see it today in Pico where local businesses I saw as a kid are now out of business and being turned into a food chain restaurant. I love *In the Heights* because it tells our story. The Latino story."

"I will say that our students have heart and put the work to make sure that they put on a fantastic production! I'm not go-

ing to lie, producing a show by myself has been stressful, but it was so rewarding to see the cast go up and bring Washington Heights to life!

A noteworthy performance in the musical is the song 96,000 which features the citizens of Washington Heights and their desires of what they would buy or do after learning that someone in the Barrio has won the lottery amounting to \$96,000. This song showcases the diversity of the neighborhood with Benny responding in a rap style, Dani and Carla responding in a dancehall beat. This song demonstrates that everyone in the community has a different style and different dreams yet they all meld together in a perfect mix.

The musical also has the opportunity to be nominated for the MACY Awards, which was founded in 1969 and is dedicated to recognizing and rewarding a variety of achievements in high school musical theatre. The MACY Awards are known to be the "OSCAR/TONY Awards" for



high school students in the Orange County. "We hope to receive Best Actor, Best Actress, Best Supporting Actor, Best Comedian, Best Set, and Best Costumes," says Olivares. "To get Best Show would be such an amazing honor, so I'm going to send out positive vibes for that one!" In terms of productions for

next year, the Drama department is already generating ideas. "We had a ballot in our programs for the show, so our patrons can help us decide which shows they want to see on our stage next year," says Olivares. The El Rancho Decathlon team discovered they will be competing in the state competition in Sacramento after find-

ing out they were in 6th place overall at the award ceremony. The state competition will be held during the middle of March at the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

In the competition, the decathletes will partake in a series

of tests where they will challenge their knowledge on this years topic, the 1960s. They will also perform a memorized speech and give an impromptu speech on a random prompt and have an interview with three judges. In the super quiz part, the team will be divided into their slots and answer questions which they have 10 seconds to answer.

In the regional competition, the team won a total of 26 medals with 16 gold, nine silver, and one bronze. The team's efforts made them very successful in the performance aspect of the competition, with most of the medals coming from the speech, essay, and interview. Every decathlete medaled in speech with eight gold and one silver, with interview and essay not that far behind.

The team also medaled in the subject tests with senior, Antonio Escobar earning medals in Economics, Math, and Literature. "It felt awesome to earn medals in subjects, it feels like I made my team and family proud,"

says Escobar. "I hope to feel that again at the state competition."

Many of the decathletes are excited about going to state and bonding more with each other. "I'm super excited to be going to state, it's been one of our goals from the very beginning," says junior Sophia Lugo. "It's the first time any of us are going to state, so I'm excited that we all get to experience this together."

"I'm looking forward to just being in the hotel," continues Lugo. "We all have such a close bond and I know we'll probably be playing *Mario Kart*, all squished in one room at two in the morning, enjoying each other's company instead of studying like other teams."

Junior Maria Juarez is also excited about the trip to Sacramento. "I'm just looking forward to spending more time with my teammates," says Juarez.

Returning members are especially excited since they were not able to compete in state last year. "I feel so proud of my team

because they worked so hard for this and definitely deserve it," says senior Jessica Castellanos.

Academic Decathlon advisor Mr. Melgar says, "I'm really glad that all the hard work and sacrifice that the team has put in from the summer has paid off." "It's exciting and I'm proud of the work the students put in to reach that goal," adds Mr. Francis, co-advisor.

"I look forward to continuing to grow this program to levels never seen before, taking what we learned this year and making it better," continues Mr. Melgar.

The team's hard work and determination led them to go onto state and they hope they can reach their goal of nationals. "My goal at state is for all of us to medal," Lugo says. "Even if this doesn't happen I'm so proud of my team for how far we've come. We've put so much time and effort into decathlon and I'm proud for us even making it this far," continues Lugo.

Residents of Pico Rivera created what seemed to be a case of online and real-life mass hysteria when an article by the Los Angeles Times made its rounds on social media, specifically on Twitter. The article explained that our fair city would be under 20 feet of water if a 45-day storm, otherwise known as the ARkStorm, ever hit the Southern California area.

According to the article written by L.A. Times reporter Louis Sahagun, the Whittier Narrows Dam is too weak to handle the rain water of the 45-day storm. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has deemed the dam unsuitable and has said that it no longer meets the tolerable risk guidelines that the agency strongly enforces.

In a worst case scenario, the dam could fail to hold back storm waters and flood the cities surrounding it. This includes cities like Montebello, Downey, Santa Fe Springs, and none other than Pico Rivera.

While the ARkStorm itself is quite the rare phenomenon, what was even more rare was the reaction from the residents of Pico Rivera. After the article was shared on Twitter by an El Rancho student, residents, mainly other El Rancho students, expressed their reactions to this information. Ranging everywhere from fearful to shock to even comedic, the reactions were widespread, but, in my opinion, completely uncalled for.

I was surprised to see that many students were actually reading an article from a reputa-

ble news source. Often we all get our news from the trending topics on Twitter or we don't follow the news at all, so seeing this article linked on many different people's Twitter accounts was quite a sight.

While I was happy to see that my peers were keeping up with the news, I was also a bit disappointed. The article was completely misunderstood and it was almost as if nobody really read through it in its entirety. Only a few key points stood out to everyone: 20 feet worth of flood water, a 45-day long storm, and a dilapidated dam.

These details are, in fact, truthful and part of the article, but many are forgetting another significant detail. This megastorm has a 1 in 900 chance of happening every year. That is approximately a .001% chance of it ever occurring. The odds are very much in our favor if you ask me.

Also, upon further research, I found that the Whittier Narrows Dam has been deemed structurally unsafe since 2017. The Los Angeles Times ran a very similar article two years ago minus the mention of the ARkStorm. Where was the mass hysteria then?

While the issue is one of great importance, I could not help but think that it was blown out of proportion. The mass hysteria created by the L.A. Times article is one case that could have been clearly avoided if everyone read through the article and didn't rely on hearsay. In my opinion, the ARkStorm is nothing to worry about. After all, who is going to stay in the area for the entire 45 days of storms? Certainly not me!

Telecom giant Huawei faces global criticism

The Chinese company Huawei has made international headlines in the past months. Huawei is a telecommunication company established in 1987. Initially, the company focused solely on manufacturing phone switches, but later expanded to everything from networks, to communications devices.

The company reported that last year it earned more than \$100 billion for the first time in company history. Huawei technology is used in 170 countries and by 45 of the 50 largest telecom operators.

Huawei planned to introduce a 5G network that would span the world, but a series of international controversies could lead to some obstacles.

The controversies stem from the belief that the Chinese government and Huawei can use their technology to steal sensi-

tive information from all countries that use it. The US government is the leader and biggest accuser of Huawei. America states that Huawei can use several “backdoors” in its technology and networks to serve to aid in securing information. Another huge issue that the US finds with Huawei, is its willingness to work with and supply technology to sanctioned countries.

A sanctioned country is one that is facing consequences by the UN, usually for crimes against its people, crimes against another country, or general disturbance of the peace. Two examples of this would be Iran and North Korea. Both of these countries have been extremely hostile towards the US and have not shown any signs of changing their behavior. However the Chinese company does not seem to have any problem with negotiating with these countries.

Huawei faced investigation for supplying both



of these countries, as well as Venezuela and Syria, with technology. These actions directly violate the economic sanctions placed on all four countries. Due to this, many executives are being accused of several crimes by the US. The Chinese government, however, is backing the company completely and it is suspected that the government is using the company to further its goals in the country and in international politics. This has led to

further tension in what is already a strained relationship between China and the United States.

These tensions reached a climax when recently the CEO of Huawei, Meng Wanzhou, was arrested in Canada at the request of the US. The Canadian government took Meng's passport and currently has her out on bail. The US is requesting her extradition while China is attempting to have her returned to China. No decisions have been

made, but the issue has split the world as to whose side to take

As stated earlier, many countries have hired the company for government contracts involving security and other communication projects. However, due to security concern spearheaded by the US, many countries are now limiting or outright banning the use of Huawei technology in their country. Some of these countries include Britain, Australia, and India.

A “Green New” dystopia

Or even the fact that the U.S isn't the biggest producer of greenhouse gasses, but instead the cost. How would we pay for such an undertaking? To be honest there are many ways, but all of them would devastate this country. Some have proposed a tax on the wealthy to pay for the green new deal but that won't work. Rich people are really good at not paying taxes, there are many loopholes in the tax code and no matter how hard you try it will always be difficult to make the rich pay a certain amount. Even pretend-

A basic outline of the green new deal is that the intended goal is to cut carbon emissions in the U.S to zero by 2030. In a controversial FAQ, her campaign team also suggested they wanted to get rid of airplanes and “farting cows.”

The last part of the deal is its proposed socialist policies. The green new deal calls for free college and free healthcare. The total cost of all of these new policies according to Forbes would be around 18.4 trillion dollars, not including the yearly 1.4 trillion for free healthcare. The U.S already is in incredible debt. We owe 22 trillion dollars and we only produce three trillion yearly. There is no feasible way to pay for this. Cortez's 70% marginal tax rate for the rich would bring in less than 700 billion dollars annually.

While many people can see how ridiculous and impractical replacing nearly every car and every single building in the United States is some people support free college and free health-

care. Every single one of these ideas is flawed especially the latter. Socialism has never and will never work. This also includes democratic socialism. For example, there never been a socialist country that hasn't fallen into ruin or collapsed like Venezuela or the Soviet Union or even Cuba.

Current socialist countries are experiencing high levels of poverty, political repression, and shortages. This has led many people to believe that democratic socialism is the exception but there has been no success there either. Hugo Chavez of Venezuela was elected and did not forcefully take over the country. Some people dismiss all of these failures and claim that Nordic countries like Sweden, Denmark, and Norway are the exception but they are not socialist countries. Not by any means are they socialist. Socialism by its very definition is that the government controls the means of productions, or put simply the government owns all the resources and the factories to produce them. one in the U.S who makes under forty thousand will only be taxed at 12% but in Sweden, an individual who makes the same amount will be taxed 60%. The Nordic countries are capitalist countries with a big welfare state. They are not socialist.

The democratic socialists including Bernie Sanders and Ocasio-Cortez have stirred up a passion amongst younger people. They ask why shouldn't college be free? Why shouldn't healthcare be free? Many of my fellow students really want these things. I myself am going to college and will amass some debt. I understand why, but there's a simple answer. Nothing is free, it just comes at someone else's expense. Cortez and Sanders have told the American people that to pay for all these expensive programs all we need to do is tax wall street and the 1% but that's not practical for many reasons.

The rich always find loopholes to pay taxes and this time won't be different, unfortunately this means the burden would land on the middle and lower class. Even pretending there were numerous benefits to free college how would we pay for it? If we took every single dollar and asset from the 1% and the richest one percent it would still be no-

where near enough to cover these programs and considering we already have a massive deficit. In fairness, Cortez did address these points and pointed out that we can print more money, but that would cause inflation. A moral argument I have heard is that if we make college free more students would be able to go to college and people would have better opportunities.

The problem with this argument is human nature, when people get things for free they don't appreciate it as much than if they had to work for it. England had free college for a long time and ended it, Forbes found that once people had to pay for college, graduation rates went up and there were more spots for students at these schools. This makes plenty of sense. There were no consequences for failing no risk so naturally, people took college less seriously. Since the colleges have to rely on student tuition, more money was allocated for increased housing and improving campuses. When colleges get money from the government, it doesn't matter if the students are happy or not and they have no reason to improve the quality of the campus. Socialism is not the way forward in regards to healthcare and college healthcare is certainly more complicated but the best argument other than the cost is that by making healthcare free competition will be stifled and innovation will decrease, although I will admit socialized healthcare would be better of our current system of the free market mixed with socialized medicine, which leaves everyone worse off.







Music teacher Reggie Cordero invites El Rancho students to grab a bow and join the school orchestra in order to help this fledgling program take flight.

The orchestra class was formed three years ago thanks to Dr. Kwek and El Rancho Unified School District funding. Before becoming the Instrumen-

tal Music Director, Cordero had taught orchestra in three other schools and conducted at the Alhambra Tri-City Orchestra and Montebello High School.

Currently, the program offers instruments such as bass, cello, viola, and violins. Enrolled students borrow these instruments to use in and out of class to study through exercises, special instruction from Cordero, workbooks, and performances. The class,

held exclusively for 1st period, is open to all grades and skill levels.

For example, senior and three-year violin veteran player Gisselle Lozano joined in 2016 when the program first started at El Rancho. Although she had no previous music experience and was challenged at first, her dedication allowed her to become one of the most skilled musicians in the ensemble.

Though it helps to have some music experience upon joining, it is not required, and many students such as Lozano have made sufficient progress. Even previously-trained musicians, like senior and one-year violin player Kayla Marroquin, will have difficulties, but she says that, "It's gonna be hard at first but with dedication, you will improve."

All that the program is looking for is dedicated students to return and become members of the program. Cordero says that the group suffers from "starting from scratch every year. We are hoping to have some of the string players from the middle school begin to join next year." This way, the ensemble can develop

as a whole and work their way up to more challenging pieces.

Some of the orchestra's pieces include traditional songs like "Burst" and "Moonlight" for beginners and the "Saint Anthony Chorale" by Johannes Brahms for the more advanced members. It's not as groovy as Guitar Hero, but classical music has proven to offer plenty of stimulating neural benefits to its listeners and players and can help develop problem-solving skills. "It is a great way to expand your knowledge in music," Lozano says. "Not many people find any interest in classical music and I think having an orchestra at El Rancho gives students a wonderful opportunity to do so."

Like all teams, the orchestra is a great place to meet new friends and building communication skills. "Getting to know other musicians and playing music together made orchestra that much more enjoyable," says Lozano. Marroquin also says, "I enjoyed playing with other musicians since we were each able to give each other constructive feedback which

made us better musicians."

Although learning a new instrument has its challenges, at the end of the year, the musicians see that it is well worth the work. These skills culminate at the end of the year with a large annual Spring Concert, typically held in April or May, in which all members of the El Rancho music programs present their pieces to friends, family, and faculty. This concert is a way of honoring all previous musicians and their hard work. "It's a pleasure seeing the improvement and learning that happens over the year," Cordero says.

The El Rancho Music Program also hosts many other underground music groups that are eager for new members, such as the jazz band, color guard, drum line, and the recently-established mariachi ensemble. Each group offers a year's credit for visual and performing arts graduation requirements, as well as the opportunity to learn musicianship and classical instruments. Alexis Gallegos: "The Achiever"


