Soccer shouldn't be kicked out of El Rancho's future

The current plan for the renovation of El Rancho High School has changed drastically from the original plan presented in the 2018-19 school year, cutting two soccer fields that were included in the initial construction plan.

Not including these fields is a poor decision that is unjust to future generations of El Rancho soccer. Even if the

decision was based on the lack of funds in the school's budget, certain costs could be cut from the stadium's construction in order to construct at least one separate soccer field.

There are four soccer teams on campus, and the original plan for the implementation of two soccer fields outside of the stadium would have accommodated the four teams for practice as well as games.

The exclusion of the soccer fields in the newly

proposed construction plan poses a question for the future of El Rancho Soccer: How will the practices for all four teams be organized in the coming school years?

If the only soccer field on campus is the one outlined on the football field, the practices will have to be held under a time constraint so that every team has an equal practice time.

On average, sports teams practice for an hour and a half to two hours in order to cover many skills that need refining. If the teams were to practice one after the other on the stadium's field, the practices would carry out late into the afternoon.

The elongated schedule would reduce the time

for students to do homework after practice, and if the school wants the students to meet grade requirements at the end of the semester, the lack of time would only make struggling students perform at a lower level.

Although extracurricular activities are optional, and grades are the main priority of the students of El Rancho, sports and after school activities are part of a well-rounded high school experience and staggered scheduling would only make that more difficult to obtain.

On the contrary, practicing at the same time in a small space presents its own difficulties. Practicing in small spaces makes the practice lose its efficiency, affect-

ing the potential success of the sports teams on campus.

Cramming four teams into one field makes the risk of injury a lot more common including loose balls that can hit a player's head if a kick is miscalculated, or a clash between players because of the lack of space.

If these soccer fields remain out of the new plan for construction, the sports teams of El Rancho face problems that could be avoided if the fields were kept in the plan.

The lack of attention by the planning committee to this issue is apparent, and sends a message to the soccer teams of El Rancho that their best interest was not kept in mind during the construction plans.

However, Gomez’s love for helping kids did not originate from an interest in being at the head of a classroom. Instead it came from his experi-


ence in coaching soccer, a sport that Gomez grew up playing.

CHEF LUNA'S CORNER: Chocolate Chip Cookies

Directions:

Want to surprise your family with your amazing baking skills? Have a happy Thanksgiving with homemade chocolate chip cookies!

Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoons hot water
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups chocolate chips

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit
2. Mix together butter, white sugar, and brown sugar until smooth. Beat in eggs one at a time, then stir in vanilla. Dissolve baking soda in hot water. Add to batter along with salt. Stir in flour and chocolate chips. Drop by larger spoonfuls onto ungreased pans.
3. Bake for about 10 minutes in the preheated oven, or until edges are browned.

You can start now by taking AP Computer Science Principles and AP Computer Science A with Mr. Crone, then when college rolls around you can choose computer science as your major.



Thanksgiving is right around the corner and for the past 11 years, it has been a day where Chef Luna and many volunteers go out to the streets of Los Angeles to feed the homeless. Much of the preparation happens at the school and is mostly done by Luna himself and volunteers. "We prepare here in my classroom on Wednesday, the day before Thanksgiving, and then on Thanksgiving, we meet here at 10 am and we leave by 11 am," says Luna. While it is a holiday, Luna does this event in the hope of helping those most in need during a time when they may need it the most. "We go through South Central and Downtown Los Angeles and we drive around looking for families in need, and we take them snacks, waters, and fruit. We don't make meals but we take them baked goods and side dishes", said Chef Luna. Aside from feeding the homeless, Luna and his helpers make sure to gift other essentials to the less fortunate families in need. "On average we make about 200 bags and these bags contain water, toilette paper, toiletries, and feminine products" says Luna, "We also take dog food and cat food because we feed homeless pets and there's a lot of small children out there so we make kids bags with popcorn, snacks, cereal, and socks." If one were interested in supporting the cause, they can do so by donating to Chef Luna's program. "Everybody in our community donates. The best dona-

tions to donate are bottled waters, juices like Hi-C juices, cereal, bags of chips, granola bars, toilette paper, and socks," says Luna. "It's usually alumni that go. Last year we had like 40 to 50 people that went with us, it was a lot of people," adds Luna, "They were all graduates from the last ten years starting back to classes of 2009." Upon being asked as to why he does such kind acts, Luna said, "That's what Thanksgivings all about, giving back."
